THE PUBLIC INTEREST DISCLOSURE (WHISTLEBLOWER PROTECTION) ACT

The Public Interest Disclosure (Whistleblower Protection) Act came into effect in April 2007. This law gives employees a clear process for disclosing concerns about significant and serious matters (wrongdoing) in the Manitoba public service, and strengthens protection from reprisal. The Act builds on protections already in place under other statutes, as well as policies, practices and processes in the Manitoba public sector.

Wrongdoing under the Act may be: contravention of federal or provincial legislation; an act or omission that endangers public safety, public health or the environment; gross mismanagement; or, knowingly directing or counseling a person to commit a wrongdoing. The Act is not intended to deal with routine operational or administrative matters.

A disclosure made by an employee in good faith, in accordance with the Act, and with a reasonable belief that wrongdoing has been or is about to be committed is considered to be a disclosure under the Act, whether or not the subject matter constitutes wrongdoing. All disclosures receive careful and thorough review to determine if action is required under the Act, and must be reported in the Corporation's annual report in accordance with Section 18 of the Act. Manitoba Film & Music did not receive any disclosures for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2015.

THE CORPORATION

Manitoba Film and Sound Recording Development Corporation (Manitoba Film & Music) is a statutory corporation of government proclaimed under the Manitoba Film and Sound Recording Development Corporation Act funded by the Province of Manitoba through the Department of Tourism, Culture, Heritage, Sport and Consumer Protection. The management of Manitoba Film & Music (MFM) reports directly to the Board of Directors appointed by the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

MFM supports Manitoba music and screen-based industries through our objectives, which are to create, stimulate, employ and invest in Manitoba by developing and promoting Manitoba companies, as well as producing and marketing film, television, video and music recording projects. MFM also promotes Manitoba as a film location for international productions.

MFM exists so that our film and music industries flourish!

GREETINGS FROM THE CHAIRPERSON AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER





On behalf of the **Manitoba Film & Music (MFM)** Board of Directors and staff, we are pleased to present the corporation's annual report for the fiscal year ending March 31, 2015.

This year's report, The Faces of Film & Music, shines a spotlight on the individuals that make up this vibrant sector. Together, the film and music industries employ over 4,300 Manitobans and touch thousands of others by engaging suppliers and service providers. With a combined economic impact of well over \$200 million per year, these industries ensure that our province retains skilled and creative people and provides attractive opportunities for our brightest Manitoba youth.

When reflecting upon the year, several faces come to mind.

Tanya Tagaq, a Brandon-based Inuk throat singer/pop artist, took home our nation's top music honour in September 2014; The Polaris Music Prize. Described as a ground-breaking tour de force, Tagaq's **MFM**-funded album 'Animism' also garnered a JUNO for Best Aboriginal Album and several other national awards and nominations.

The Bros. Landreth, who took home a JUNO for Roots/Traditional Album of the Year, had a banner year that included signing a deal with American label Slate Creek Records and embarking on an international tour. The band has been touted by media as "the next big thing" in Canadian music and shows no signs of slowing down.

On the film side, many Manitoba faces were seen on the silver screen this year thanks to the series *The Pinkertons*, a 22 episode drama about America's first detective agency. The syndicated series employed 95% Manitoba crew, with 96% of acting roles filled by locals.

Two other series, *Polar Bear Alley* and *Sunnyside*, also employed a great deal of Manitoba crew and talent. Shot in Winnipeg's West Broadway neighbourhood, the sketch comedy series *Sunnyside* has been renewed for another six episodes, with filming slated for spring 2015. The factual series *Polar Bear Alley* was shot in Churchill, showcasing Manitoba's beautiful and unique landscapes to the world.

Winnipeg's world-renowned filmmaker Guy Maddin also met with great success this year. His newest film *The Forbidden Room* received high profile screening at two of the world's most prominent film festivals; Berlinale (the Berlin International Film Festival) and Sundance. **MFM** was in Berlin to help market the film and partnered with Travel Manitoba on a trip give-away to see 'Guy Maddin's Manitoba'.

Although there was much to celebrate this year, our industry also experienced extreme loss with the death of Kevin Walters. A former beloved MFM staff member, Kevin was a tireless champion of the arts in Manitoba and helped foster a generation of musicians. His legacy of mentorship lives on through the Kevin Walters Memorial Fund, which supports promising performers and organizations in music, film, performance and the creative arts.

In closing, we would like to take this opportunity to thank those who champion this industry and the work of **Manitoba Film & Music**. Thank you to the Government of Manitoba for their ongoing support. Thank you to Minister Ron Lemieux and Deputy Minister Terry Goertzen from the Department of Tourism, Culture, Heritage, Sport and Consumer Protection.

Thank you to our partners and colleagues at the City of Winnipeg, On Screen Manitoba, Manitoba Music, Telefilm Canada, the Canada Media Fund, the National Screen Institute, Film Training Manitoba, the National Film Board of Canada and the Winnipeg Film Group for your hard work and dedication to film and music in Manitoba.

We would also like to thank the staff of **Manitoba Film & Music**, as well as the Board of Directors, who give their time and passion to ensure that our film and music industries flourish. Your dedication makes all of this possible.

Finally, we would like to thank all of those who support Manitoba talent. With such a supportive and vibrant environment in which to thrive, our musicians, filmmakers, crew and industry professionals will continue to make our province more culturally rich and economically vibrant.



TANYA TAGAO: A FORCE OF NATURE



Brandon-based Inuk throat singer Tanya Tagaq made a huge impact on the Canadian music scene this year with her MFM-funded album 'Animism'. After winning the nation's most prestigious award, The Polaris Music Prize (given to the musician with the highest artistic integrity, without regard to musical genre, professional affiliation or sales history). Tagag went on to receive a JUNO Award. a Canadian Folk Music Award and several other nominations. 'Animism' has received major critical accolades in Canada and around the world, with her music being referred to as "groundbreaking" and "an overwhelming life force". Through her work and public profile, Tagaq has brought awareness to myriad social issues involving Aboriginal Peoples including missing and murdered Aboriginal women, poverty, Truth and Reconciliation and others.

GUY MADDIN'S THE FORBIDDEN ROOM



Winnipeg's own world-renowned filmmaker Guy Maddin launched his latest project The Forbidden Room to great fanfare at both the Berlin International Film Festival (Berlinale) and Sundance. At Berlinale the film had a high-profile screening as part of the Experimental Strand, a programme that features 'avant garde' filmmaking from around the world. The Forbidden Room is made up of several Séances or Spiritismes filmed by Maddin in various international locations (including Centre Pompidou in Paris and the MOMA in New York) over the past two years. The film features many



international stars including Charlotte Rampling, Udo Kier, Mathieu Amalric and others. In celebration of the high-profile screening of The Forbidden Room. MFM partnered with Travel Manitoba to provide a 'Maddin Manitoba' trip giveaway at the Canada reception at Berlinale, which included a tour of various Manitoba cultural attractions given by Maddin himself, a trip to Churchill to see the Beluga whales and a stopover in Gimli, the setting of Maddin's film Tales from the Gimli Hospital.

MANITOBA MUSICIANS FOR THE WIN



In the last fiscal year, MFM-funded albums were nominated for 33 prestigious national awards and won 14.

Capping off the Province of Manitoba's Year of Music, BreakOut West (including the Western Canadian Music Awards) was hosted in Winnipeg October 2 –5, 2014. Manitoba dominated the awards with 44 total nominations for local acts and industry, including 16 for MFM-funded albums. Manitoba musicians picked up an unprecedented 17 awards in artistic and industry categories, including 10 for MFM-funded projects.

Manitoba also had a fantastic showing at this year's JUNO Awards with four nominations and two wins for MFM-funded projects. Tanya Tagaq took home the JUNO for Aboriginal Album of the Year, while young roots rockers The Bros. Landreth were awarded Roots Traditional Album of the Year in the Group category. Tagaq doubled-up with a nomination for Alternative Album of the year and local troubadour Del Barber was nominated for Roots Traditional Album of the Year in the Solo category.

Manitoba acts were also recognized with nominations at the Indigenous Music Awards, the SiriusXM Indies and the Canadian Folk Music Awards - where Tanya Tagaq and The Bros. Landreth won the Pushing the Boundaries and the New/Emerging Artist of the Year categories respectively.

MANITOBA FILM SUCCESSES

This past fiscal year, we had a number of made-in-Manitoba projects honoured with award nominations, wins and festival selections.

At the Canadian Screen Awards, Manitoba projects had several nominations including the **MFM**-supported project *Illegal Eater* produced by Manitoba company Farpoint Films and Middle Child Films (for Travel & Escape), which was nominated for Best Lifestyle for Talk Program Series. This same series was also lauded at the Banff World Media Festival for Best Writing in a Lifestyle or Reality/Competition Program or Series.

Other Manitoba nominees for Canadian Screen Awards included the Inferno Pictures made-for-television film *Bunks*, nominated for two awards including Best Dramatic Mini-Series or TV Movie and Best Direction in a Dramatic Program or Mini-Series; and Frantic Films for projects *A DORE To Winnipeg* (nominated for Best Direction in a Variety or Sketch Comedy Program or Series and Best Writing in a Variety or Sketch Comedy Program or Series) and *Meet the Family* (nominated for Best Picture Editing in a Comedy or variety Program or Series).

On May 6th, DOXA (Documentary Film festival) presented Weird Old Winnipeg, featuring 9 short films from Winnipeg filmmakers; Ryan McKenna, Matthew Rankin, Dave Barber, Leslie Supnet, Aaron Zeghers, Nigel Webber, Walter Forsberg, Rhayne Vermette, Jaimz Asmundson and Karen Asmundson.

In April, the short comedy *Will the Real Dave Barber Please Stand Up?* screened at the 21st edition of Hot Docs Canadian International Documentary Festival in Toronto. Merit Motion Pictures project

Vietnam: Canada's Shadow War was nominated for award at Yorkton Film Festival 2014, and Konofilm Productions Inc. won the award for Documentary Arts & Culture at the 2014 Yorkton Film Festival.

Shelagh Carter's short dance film *Is It My Turn* recently received Awards of Excellence and Merit in the categories of 'Choreography' and 'Experimental' at the Accolade Global Film Competition in La Jolla, California this past November. *Treading Water: Plight of the Manitoba First Nation Flood Evacuees* won Best Short Documentary at the imagineNATIVE Film + Media Arts Festival.

Original Pictures' President Kim Todd took the stage at the 2014 Emmy's to accept the award for Outstanding Miniseries for her work on Fargo. The series also won for Outstanding Directing for a Miniseries, Movie or Dramatic Special for the episode 'Buridan's Ass' directed by Colin Bucksey. Fargo was nominated for a total of 18 Emmys. Sonya Ballantyne's project Crash Site was selected as the winner of the RBC Emerging Filmmaker Competition during the 2014 Gimli Film Festival. We Were Children, produced by Eagle Vision, Entertainment One and the National Film Board in association with APTN won the prize in the history category in the best in unscripted competition at the Banff World Media Festival. At the Female Eye Film Festival Paula Kelly's feature film drama Euphoria won the top award Best of Show and received Audience Choice Award at the Green Bay Film Festival. Manitoban Merit Jensen Carr was awarded a lifetime achievement award from the Women Entrepreneur of The Year Awards. Director Aaron Floresco was awarded the Bravo Factual Grant.

SPOTLIGHT ON SERIES: CREATING JOBS FOR MANITOBANS







The last fiscal year saw three major series' film throughout the province. A series is especially beneficial to the industry because it provides more long-term employment for cast and crew, as well as valuable training opportunities for young industry professionals.


The Pinkertons, a 22-episode drama based on America's first detective agency, shot in Grosse Isle, Manitoba and made use of the historic Prairie Dog Express train and station. Produced by local company Buffalo Gal Pictures, along with Suzanne Berger at Rosetta Media, the series was created using 95% Manitoba crew, with 96% of acting roles allocated to Manitobans.

Sunnyside, a sketch comedy series shot in Winnipeg's West Broadway neighbourhood, filmed six half- hour episodes in the last fiscal year, with seven more slated to shoot in the spring of 2015. The series, broadcast on City, is produced by local company Buffalo Gal Pictures, alongside Counterfeit Pictures.

The series *Polar Bear Alley*, featuring the province's beautiful Northern landscapes, shot in Churchill, Manitoba last fiscal. Produced by local company Merit Motion Pictures, the factual series is broadcast on OLN.

HYENA ROAD

In early fall 2014, the Paul Gross project *Hyena Road* filmed at the Canadian Forces Base in Shilo, Manitoba. *Hyena Road* was written, directed and produced by Gross, who also starred in the film. The story follows three individuals and their experiences in the war in Afghanistan. The film, co-produced by local company Buffalo Gal Pictures, along with Rhombus Media, was also shot in Jordan. There will be a red carpet screening of *Hyena Road* in Winnipeg in the fall of 2015, following a high-profile premiere at the Toronto Film Festival.





REMEMBERING KEVIN WALTERS

Manitoba's cultural industries were shaken this year by the death of one of our greatest champions, Kevin Walters. A former staff member, Kevin helped foster and mentor a generation of musicians as the Manager of Music Programs at Manitoba Film & Music.

After his time at MFM, he planned high profile events including the JUNOS, Culture Days and Manitoba Homecoming, and served as the Chair of the Board of Directors at Manitoba Music. Kevin's legacy of fostering talent lives on through the Kevin Walters Memorial Fund, which supports promising performers and organizations in music, film, performance and the creative arts. Proceeds from this year's Manitoba Music Rocks Charity Bonspiel, a joint initiative of MFM and Manitoba Music, were donated to the fund.

On Screen Manitoba's All Access Forum is a key annual event that brings broadcasters, funding organizations, distributors (both film and television) and other guest speakers to Winnipeg to meet with the Manitoba media production community over two and half days, with sessions for both English and French-language markets. MFM is proud to participate as a sponsor of this event, and to contribute expertise through staff participation on panels and networking sessions. The January 2015 forum brought high-level industry professionals from Bell Media, Rogers, CBC and other sought-after partners to create opportunities for Manitoba filmmakers and producers.

FILM & TELEVISION **IN MANITOBA**

MFM exists so that Manitoba's film and television industries flourish! We achieve this by developing and promoting Manitoba companies, supporting the production and marketing of film and television projects, as well as promoting Manitoba as a film location to offshore production companies. Our objectives are to enhance Manitoba's screen-based industries, thereby increasing employment and stimulating business for local service providers.

MFM is a long-standing member of the Association of Film Commissioners International (AFCI). In addition to administering film programs and tax credit incentives, MFM is a full-service film commission that offers a broad range of location services including script breakdown, location scouting as well as government, business and industry liaison services. MFM has helped to attract such films and television programs as Aloft, The Pinkertons, Heaven is for Real, Sunnyside, Goon, The Assassination of Jesse James by the Coward Robert Ford, Capote and many others.

Over the past ten years, Manitoba has seen over a billion dollars in local production, over half of which has been spent in the province on salaries, services and supplies. Out of the total production volume, our province has contributed around 15% in investments and incentives.

During the last fiscal year, \$113.6 million in production took place in the province. This figure represents the total budgets for films that shot in Manitoba any time between April 1, 2014 and March 31, 2015.

Nearly half of this \$113.6 million was spent in the province on employment and services. In more ways than one, the film and television industries are good for Manitoba.

This year, Manitoba invested in 13 feature films, 22 television series (including drama and documentary), and 32 other projects including short films and television specials. Out of these 67 projects, 39 were documentaries. This year MFM also received 103 scripts and hosted 12 companies who traveled to MB to scout for their projects.








FILM & TELEVISION PRODUCTION ACTIVITY

TAX CREDIT

Along with Manitoba Film & Music's equity financing, The Manitoba Film and Video Production Tax Credit is essential in attracting production to the province. Manitoba's generous tax credit is a key factor in our ability to create local employment opportunities and attract significant economic investment to the province.

The Manitoba Film and Video Tax Credit provides a rebate of up-to 65% on eligible Manitoba labour or 30% on eligible local expenditures. Details on the tax credit can be found at www.mbfilmmusic.ca.

A total of 104 tax credit applications were received during the fiscal year. This represents nearly \$174.6 million in production activity for projects which took place in the current and prior years.

FILM - OTHER DOLLARS LEVERAGED

Financing of independent productions requires financial investment from several sources. Manitoba Film & Musio's equity commitment to a project will often trigger other investors to participate. Other than funds from MFM and the Manitoba Film & Video Tax Credit, other sources for production financing investments come from the Canada Media Fund, Telefilm Canada, market support (broadcaster licenses, distribution advances), federal and other government support and tax credits, and private sector (i.e. production company investment, deferrals, private investments, private funds, private investors, and lenders for loans and gap financing).

With Manitoba's equity financing and estimated tax credit support totalling \$22.7 million, \$113.6 million in indigenous, co-production and foreign production activity occurred in this fiscal. This means that 80% of total investment came from other sources such as those listed in the above paragraph. Manitoba's modest investment continues to attract millions of dollars in additional revenues into Manitoba's economy.

TELEVISION AND WEB-BASED PRODUCTION FUND AND FEATURE FILM PRODUCTION FUND

These programs assist in the production financing of fully developed feature film, television, or web-based projects through equity investments. The projects are reviewed based on their economic impact in Manitoba and are awarded bonuses for diversity in culture and language, as well as the inclusion of Manitobans in key creative positions.

During the fiscal year, 13 new applications were approved for a total investment of \$1,824,775

FEATURE FILM DEVELOPMENT FUND AND TELEVISION AND WEB-BASED DEVELOPMENT FUND

Through these programs, eligible applicants may receive financial assistance for the development of viable motion picture concepts into screenplays for television, the Internet and theatrical release. Financing under both of these programs takes the form of non-interest bearing recoupable loans and is committed according to phases, depending on the program. Should the project qualify for production financing, the development loan can be converted into an equity investment.

PITCH READINESS PROGRAM FOR MULTI-EPISODE PRODUCTIONS (PRE-MARKET DEVELOPMENT)

This program assists producers of multi-episode productions who have not yet obtained broadcaster or distributor financial support to prepare the strongest pitch presentations possible. The assistance takes the form of recoupable loans.

GRANT PROGRAM FOR EMERGING TALENT AND MICRO-BUDGET PRODUCTION

This program is designed to support two streams of micro-budget productions:

- Entry-level filmmakers who have received production funding awards through a competitive, juried process from a recognized industry organization (ex. Telefilm, NSI, Manitoba Arts Council).
 These projects are not normally destined for theatrical distribution or primetime television exhibition.
- Producers of factual or scripted programming for projects with micro-budgets that do not exceed \$100,000 and who have received a cash license or a distribution advance from an industry-recognized third-party distributor.

During the fiscal year, 6 applications were approved for a total investment of \$47,928

FEATURE FILM MARKETING FUND

This program assists eligible applicants with the promotion and marketing of feature film projects at time of theatrical release and at festivals and markets to either enhance the promotion and marketing of the release theatrically and/or to attract the attention of distributors/sales agents and increase the commercial interest in the project. It is intended to compliment resources, financial and otherwise, committed by the distributor of the film.

Annual Report

MUSIC IN MANITOBA

MFM exists so Manitoba's music industry flourishes! We achieve this by offering a series of music funding programs to help enhance and foster the province's impressive music scene. MFM also attends and supports a variety of music festivals, conferences and showcases to effectively market Manitoba artists and create business networking opportunities.

This year, **MFM** provided \$509,000 in funding toward 130 music projects- making our investment the key element of support to Manitoba's emerging and established musicians. Projects are funded through the Music Recording Production Fund (Levels 1, 2 and 3), the Recording Artist Touring Support Program, the Record Marketing Support Program, the Music Video Fund and the Music Recording Production Fund for Out-of-Province Artists.

Applications to MFM's music recording programs are evaluated through a juried process. Music recording proposals must be unanimously recommended for funding by a minimum of two juries. Juries are made up of local music industry professionals specializing in a specific genre of music. They may include producers, broadcasters, managers, label owners or representatives, artists, songwriters, media, and retailers.

Applications to the Record Product Marketing Fund, the Music Video Fund and the Recording Artists Touring Support Fund are evaluated by **MFM** based on project development plans, artist tracks records, touring schedules, strength of support team and distribution plans. There were over 200 applications to this year's music programs.

Manitoba Film & Music sincerely thanks all of the jurors who so generously give their time.





MUSIC PRODUCTION ACTIVITY

During the 2014/2015 fiscal year, **Manitoba Film & Music** provided \$509,000 in funding to 130 music projects including recording, touring, marketing and music video creation initiatives.

MFM provided \$196,721 toward 45 music and music video recording projects with total estimated budgets of over \$640,000.

As funding for Manitoba artists from other sources is often limited, our investment is the key element of support for the province's emerging and established musicians. The graph indicates the crucial importance of **MFM**'s investment in our local music recording industry.

Market Access Program

As a program of the M3P project, the Market Access Program is supported with program assistance from Manitoba Film & Music and administered by Manitoba Music.

The aim of the program is to provide Manitoba artists and music industry professionals with development opportunities by attending professionally organized music industry conferences and showcases.

In the last fiscal year (2013/2014), **MFM** provided two years' worth of funding to the program at \$110,000 (\$55,000 each year).

Manitoba Film & Music is also helping to foster Aboriginal talent in Manitoba by supporting the Aboriginal Music Program (AMP) administered through Manitoba Music. This program helps First Nations, Métis, and Inuit people develop sustainable careers in Manitoba's music industry, and delivers programming and services that respond to the needs of the industry. AMP, in existence since 2004, is the only program of its kind in Canada.

1. NATURE OF OPERATIONS

Manitoba Film & Sound Recording Development Corporation (the "Organization") is a statutory corporation created by the Province of Manitoba through The Manitoba Film and Sound Recording Development Corporation Act and is exempt from income taxes. The main objective of the Organization is to foster growth of the Manitoba film and music recording industries by providing financing and other assistance.

The Organization has been designated by the Minister of Finance to administer the Manitoba Film and Video Production Tax Credit Program, including registration of productions and review of tax credit applications.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

These financial statements are the representations of management, prepared in accordance with Canadian public sector accounting standards for government non-for-profit organizations, including the 4200 series of standards, as issued by the Public Sector Accounting Board of the Chartered Professional Accountants of Canada, and include the following significant accounting policies:

Capital assets

Purchased capital assets are recorded at cost. Amortization is provided using the straight-line method at rates intended to amortize the cost of assets over their estimated useful lives. The annual rates are as follows:

Program funding

The Organization provides grant funding to Manitoba companies and individuals in order to promote Manitoba's film and music recording artists and industries. The grant may take the form of equity financing from which, in the future, there may be a recovery of principal or return on investment.

Revenue recognition

a) Program recoupments

Any recovery of principal or return on investment of programs funded is recorded as program recoupments when received.

b) Province of Manitoba funding

Province of Manitoba funding is based on the Province of Manitoba's annual allocation to the Organization and is recorded as revenue on an accrual basis.

c) Jump Start program recoupments

Any recovery of principal or return on investment of programs funded under the Jump Start program must be re-invested in the Organization's Market Driven Television Production and Market Driven Feature Film Production financing programs within the fiscal year that the recoupment occurs, if possible. If not possible, recoupments will be deferred to the following fiscal year and recognized as revenue at that time.

Short-term investments

Short-term investments consist of guaranteed investment certificates held with the Organization's financial institution, and are measured at cost less impairment.

Measurement uncertainty (use of estimates)

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian public sector accounting standards for government non-for-profit organizations, including the 4200 series of standards, as issued by the Public Sector Accounting Board of the Chartered Professional Accountants of Canada, requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements, and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period.

Accounts receivable are stated after evaluation as to their collectibility and an appropriate allowance for doubtful accounts is provided where considered necessary. Amortization of capital assets is provided based on the estimated useful lives of capital assets.

These estimates and assumptions are reviewed periodically and, as adjustments become necessary they are reported in excess of expenses over revenues in the periods in which they become known.

Long-lived assets

Long-lived assets consist of capital assets. Long-lived assets held for use are measured and amortized as described in the applicable accounting policies.

The Organization performs impairment testing on long-lived assets held for use whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value of an asset, or group of assets, may not be recoverable. Impairment losses are recognized when undiscounted future cash flows from its use and disposal are less than the asset's carrying amount. Impairment is measured as the amount by which the asset's carrying value exceeds its fair value. Any impairment is included in operations for the year.

Financial instruments

The Organization recognizes its financial instruments when the Organization becomes party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument. All financial instruments subsequently measured at fair value are immediately recognized in excess of expenses over revenue.

At initial recognition, the Organization may irrevocably elect to subsequently measure any financial instrument at fair value. The Organization has not made such an election during the year.

The Organization subsequently measures investments in equity instruments quoted in an active market and all derivative instruments, except those designated in a qualifying hedging relationship or that are linked to, and must be settled by delivery of, unquoted equity instruments of another entity, at fair value. Fair value is determined by published price quotations. Investments in equity instruments not quoted in an active market and derivatives that are linked to, and must be settled by delivery of, unquoted equity instruments of another entity, are subsequently measured at cost less impairment. With the exception of financial liabilities indexed to a measure of the Organization's performance or value of its equity and those instruments designated at fair value, all other financial assets and liabilities are subsequently measured at amortized cost.

Transaction costs and financing fees directly attributable to the origination, acquisition, issuance or assumption of financial instruments subsequently measured at fair value are immediately recognized in the excess of expenses over revenues for the current period. Conversely, transaction costs and financing fees are added to the carrying amount for those financial instruments subsequently measured at amortized cost or cost.

Pension costs and obligations

The Organization provides pension benefits to its employees.

Employees of the Organization are provided pension benefits by the Civil Service Superannuation Fund (the "Fund"). Under paragraph 6 of the Civil Service Superannuation Act, the Organization is described as a "matching employer" and its contribution toward the pension benefits is limited to matching the employees' contributions to the Fund. The Organization's contribution for the year was \$52,502 (2014 - \$49,072) and is included in employees benefits expense.

In addition, certain employees of the Organization are entitled to enhanced pension benefits. A pension liability has been established for those employees whose annual earnings exceed the limit under the Civil Service Superannuation Fund Plan. The Organization's payments to eligible employees under the enhanced pension benefits plan for the year were \$nil (2014 - \$nil) and are included in the calculation of employees' benefits expense. The cost is actuarially determined using the projected benefit methods and reflects management's best estimate of salary increase and the age at which the employee will retire. The Organization has internally designated its short-term investment (see Note 4) to meet its obligations for providing enhanced pension benefits to

7. INDUSTRY SUPPORT

The Organization indirectly supports the on-going development of creative talent, business skills and capacity building of various film, television and music recording professionals by providing funding for specific programming administered by organizations such as Manitoba Music, On Screen Manitoba, the National Screen Institute Canada and the Winnipeg Film Group. Programs supported include Access to Markets, Aboriginal Music Program, Features First, Drama Prize, Totally Television, New Voices and WFG First Film, Post-Production and Marketing funds.

PROGRAM DELIVERY

Program delivery also includes the expenses associated with the delivery of the Manitoba Film & Video Production Tax Credit Program ("MTC"). While the value of the MTC does not flow through the Organization, the management of it does and is therefore determined to be worth noting. A total of 104 applications were received for processing during the 2015 fiscal year (2014 - 119). This represents production activity for projects which took place in the current and prior years, in excess of \$174 million worth of production activity (2014 - \$136 million). The tax credits are subject to approval by the Province of Manitoba. The cost to administer the Program in the fiscal year was approximately \$110,486 (2014 - \$88,302).
